

Professor Richard C. Reuben

Current Research Interests

Professor Reuben's current research interests center on arbitration, the relationship between dispute resolution and democratic governance, as well as the transformation of conflict, especially through media coverage.

He recently published an article entitled *Personal Autonomy and Vacatur after Hall Street*, 113 PA. ST. L. REV. 1103 (2009), in which he argued that the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark decision in *Hall Street Associates v. Mattel*, 128 S.Ct. 1396 (2008), effectively eliminates most non-statutory grounds for the vacatur of arbitral awards.

Professor Reuben has in production an article entitled *The Impact of News Coverage on Conflict*, ___ MARQ. L. REV. ___ (forthcoming 2009), in which he combines conflict theory with mass communications empirical methods to create a framework for assessing the news media's likely impact on conflict that it covers.

He is currently working on an article on interest-based reporting for journalists, and a book on conflict theory for lawyers.
